
#### SAUL, DAVID, & SOLOMON Lessons In Faith





### I SAMUEL 17



# In Chapter 17 David goes from shepherd boy, to court musician and armor bearer, to defender of Israel.








"Now the Philistines gathered together their armies to battle, and were gathered together at Shochoh, which belongeth to Judah, and pitched between Shochoh and Azekah, in Ephesdammim."




It was not long before this that the Philistines were soundly beaten (Chapter 14).

Jonathan lead that first attack, and an earthquake frightened the Philistines into retreat.

The Philistines would have been completely defeated if not for King Saul. He stopped his garrison's attack to confront Jonathan about eating honey and to offer sacrifice for the people that had sinned by eating meat with the blood.



The Philistines (it is probable) had heard that Samuel had fallen out with Saul and forsaken him. No longer advised by Samuel, Saul's enemies were ready to take advantage of him.



The reason Samuel fell out with Saul was because King Saul had sinned:

#### He offered

a sacrifice without authority, and Samuel told him his kingdom would not continue.


#### He started

getting his advice from the priest Ahiah.

#### He grew depressed

and unable to function.

David was called upon to play music to calm him.



"<sup>2</sup>And Saul and the men of Israel were gathered together, and pitched by the valley of Elah, and set the battle in array against the Philistines."



Modern photo of the valley of Elah


"<sup>3</sup>And the Philistines stood on a mountain on the one side, and Israel stood on a mountain on the other side: and there was a valley between them."

"4And there went out a champion out of the camp of the Philistines, named Goliath, of Gath, whose height was six cubits and a span."

Some say this measurement is 9' 6" and other sources 11' 4"





"<sup>5</sup>And he had an helmet of brass upon his head, and he was armed with a coat of mail; and the weight of the coat was five thousand shekels of brass.

<sup>6</sup>And he had greaves of brass upon his legs, and a target of brass between his shoulders."






"7And the staff of his spear was like a weaver's beam; and his spear's head weighed six hundred shekels of iron: and one bearing a shield went before him."


"8And he stood and cried unto the armies of Israel, and said unto them, Why are ye come out to set your battle in array? am not I a Philistine, and ye servants to Saul? choose you a man for you, and let him come down to me.

<sup>9</sup>If he be able to fight with me, and to kill me, then will we be your servants: but if I prevail against him, and kill him, then shall ye be our servants, and serve us.


<sup>10</sup>And the Philistine said, I defy the armies of Israel this day; give me a man, that we may fight together."








"12Now David was the son of that Ephrathite of Bethlehemjudah, whose name was Jesse; and he had eight sons . . . <sup>13</sup>And the three eldest sons of Jesse went and followed Saul to the battle: and the names of his three sons that went to the battle were Eliab the firstborn, and next unto him Abinadab, and the third Shammah. <sup>14</sup>And David was the youngest: and the three eldest followed Saul."






David had been King Saul's armor bearer and musician for a short time but had returned to tend his father's sheep.



"19Now Saul, and they, and all the men of Israel, were in the valley of Elah, fighting with the Philistines.

<sup>20</sup>And David rose up early in the morning, and left the sheep with a keeper, and took, and went, as Jesse had commanded him . . ."

The fighting was most likely frequent skirmishes between small detached parties.





"<sup>20</sup>. . . And he came to the trench, as the host was going forth to the fight, and shouted for the battle. <sup>21</sup>For Israel and the Philistines had put the battle in array, army against army. <sup>22</sup>And David left his carriage in the hand of the keeper of the carriage, and ran into the army, and came and saluted his brethren."



"<sup>23</sup>And as he talked with them, behold, there came up the champion, the Philistine of Gath, Goliath by name, out of the armies of the Philistines, and spake according to the same words: and David heard them."









"26And David spake to the men that stood by him, saying, What shall be done to the man that killeth this Philistine, and taketh away the reproach from Israel? for who is this uncircumcised Philistine, that he should defy the armies of the living God?

<sup>27</sup>And the people answered him after this manner, saying, So shall it be done to the man that killeth him."




"28And Eliab his eldest brother heard when he spake unto the men; and Eliab's anger was kindled against David, and he said, Why camest thou down hither? and with whom hast thou left those few sheep in the wilderness? I know thy pride, and the naughtiness of thine heart; for thou art come down that thou mightest see the battle."



"29 And David said, What have I now done? Is there not a cause?

<sup>30</sup>And he turned from him toward another, and spake after the same manner: and the people answered him again after the former manner."



"<sup>31</sup>And when the words were heard which David spake, they rehearsed them before Saul: and he sent for him. <sup>32</sup>And David said to Saul, Let no man's heart fail because of him; thy servant will go and fight with this Philistine. <sup>33</sup>And Saul said to David, Thou art not able to go against this Philistine to fight with him: for thou art but a youth, and he a man of war from his youth."




"<sup>34</sup>And David said unto Saul, Thy servant kept his father's sheep, and there came a lion, and a bear, and took a lamb out of the flock: <sup>35</sup>And I went out after him, and smote him, and delivered it out of his mouth: and when he arose against me, I caught him by his beard, and smote him, and slew him."



"<sup>36</sup>Thy servant slew both the lion and the bear: and this uncircumcised Philistine shall be as one of them, seeing he hath defied the armies of the living God. <sup>37</sup>David said moreover, The LORD that delivered me out of the paw of the lion, and out of the paw of the bear, he will deliver me out of the hand of this Philistine . . ."







How curious that David is asked to wear the king's armor—


David had been responsible for King Saul's armor when he was his armor bearer. King Saul had forgotten David. We do not know how long it had been since David had left serving Saul and gone back to keep his father's sheep but it could not have been very long (v. 15).









"<sup>41</sup>And the Philistine came on and drew near unto David; and the man that bare the shield went before him. <sup>42</sup>And when the Philistine looked about, and saw David, he disdained him: for he was but a youth, and ruddy, and of a fair countenance. <sup>43</sup>And the Philistine said unto David, Am I a dog, that thou comest to me with staves? And the Philistine cursed David by his gods."




"<sup>44</sup>And the Philistine said to David, Come to me, and I will give thy flesh unto the fowls of the air, and to the beasts of the field. <sup>45</sup>Then said David to the Philistine, Thou comest to me with a sword, and with a spear, and with a shield: but I come to thee in the name of the LORD of hosts, the God of the armies of Israel, whom thou hast defied."




"46This day will the LORD deliver thee into mine hand; and I will smite thee, and take thine head from thee; and I will give the carcases of the host of the Philistines this day unto the fowls of the air, and to the wild beasts of the earth; that all the earth may know that there is a God in Israel. <sup>47</sup>And all this assembly shall know that the LORD saveth not with sword and spear: for the battle is the LORD's, and he will give you into our hands."





"48 And it came to pass, when the Philistine arose, and came, and drew nigh to meet David, that David hastened, and ran toward the army to meet the Philistine."








"52And the men of Israel and of Judah arose, and shouted, and pursued the Philistines, until thou come to the valley, and to the gates of Ekron. And the wounded of the Philistines fell down by the way to Shaaraim, even unto Gath, and unto Ekron.


53And the children of Israel returned from chasing after the Philistines, and they spoiled their tents."




"54And David took the head of the Philistine, and brought it to Jerusalem; but he put his armour in his tent."

And David answered, I am the son of thy servant Jesse the Bethlehemite."



Soon King Saul will discover that this young man was chosen to take his place as king.
